Our OIA 2024/11: The COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund (CRRF)

The Institute has emailed a final draft of our submission to the <u>NZ Royal Commission COVID-19</u> <u>Lessons Learned</u>. This included an analysis of the COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund (CRRF) funding decisions excel, found on the Treasury's website, see <u>here</u>. Using this excel, we created two graphs (see far below in grey). From this work, we identified three outstanding issues. We have turned these three outstanding issues into three questions. Once we have received answers to these questions, we will update the graphs and provide the Commissioners a final copy of our submission.

Question 1: What is the difference between (i) the 'actual sum of money ring-fenced by the Government' versus (ii) the 'funding envelope for budget management purposes'? Could you explain the difference, and ideally the pros and cons of each? We found a brief explanation

Background The CRRF was established in Budget 2020 as a temporary fiscal management tool to support New Zealand's response to and recovery from COVID-19. Rather than being an actual sum of money ring-fenced by the Government, it was a funding envelope for budget management purposes that provided an indication of what the Government would be willing to spend, if necessary, to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 on the health of New Zealanders and the economy. The CRRF was closed in Budget 2022. Some initiatives are still underway and will be managed through standard fiscal management processes as COVID-19 response and recovery measures are now integrated into standard public service delivery.

Question 2: When preparing the two graphs (far below), we noticed the sum (\$86,759,410) being the sum of each column (excluding the sum of fiscal impact) does not equal the sum (\$70,436,787) at the right hand column (being the 'sum of fiscal impact'). Is this an issue with the excel? Can you explain?

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






Figure 4.3: Government appropriations in response to COVID-19: (NZ\$86.8 billi as at 14 June 2023152 [[not final]]
