Less than two weeks to go until the *TacklingPovertyNZ* workshop in Rotorua – Friday, 19 August 2016

The McGuinness Institute's *TacklingPovertyNZ* workshop is on tour. We are heading to Rotorua on Friday, 19 August 2016. This one-day workshop tour was sparked by the national *TacklingPovertyNZ* workshop held in December 2015, an initiative of the McGuinness Institute in collaboration with the New Zealand Treasury.

On the morning of Friday, 19 August 2016, participants of the Rotorua workshop will hear from the New Zealand Treasury's Chief Economist Dr Girol Karacaoglu, and Chair of the Data Futures Partnership Working Group Dame Diane Robertson, followed by participants from the December *TacklingPovertyNZ* workshop. Participants will also hear from local speakers. These presentations will provide a broad national and local context for the conversation around how to tackle poverty in New Zealand. The afternoon's discussions will focus on the challenges and opportunities facing the local community, and participants will then present their proposals for local solutions at a public event in the evening.

The workshop will take place at Concert Chamber, Sir Howard Morrison Performing Arts Centre, 1170 Fenton Street, Rotorua from 9.00 to 4.15 pm. The workshop will culminate in a public presentation by the participants from 4.30 to 5.30 pm, followed by refreshments. The purpose was to test our approach to see if a useful outcome could be achieved in one day. *Discussion Paper 2016/01: A Queenstown Lakes District perspective on tackling poverty* is now available <u>online</u>. A similar discussion paper will be produced from the Rotorua workshop, and together these papers will provide an insight into the different regional perspectives on poverty in New Zealand, in order to inform national decision-making and to support local initiatives.
